

~ The 1208 Program ~ Where 1033 Came From


- **Section 1208 of the National Defense Authorization Act of Fiscal Year 1990**
 - Congress authorized the Secretary of Defense to transfer DoD excess personal property to Drug Law Enforcement Agencies
 - Management responsibility rested with OSD Office of Drug Enforcement Policy and Support (DEP&S)





~ The 1208 Program ~

- **OSD executed the 1208 Program through Regional Logistical Support Offices (RLSOs)**
 - **Offices operated independently**
 - **Program Guidelines non-standard**





~ The 1208 Program ~

- **June 1995 - OSD transferred Program Manager responsibilities to the Defense Logistics Agency (DLA)**
 - **DLA established a business relationship between states and DLA via a Memorandum of Agreement (MOA)**
 - **Developed Plan to Consolidate RLSOs**
 - **Established the DLA Law Enforcement Support Office (LESO) at Ft Belvoir, Virginia**
 - **Standardized Program Management and Guidelines**





~ From 1208 to 1033 ~

- **Fall 1996 - Congress rescinded Section 1208 and replaced it with Section 1033. 1033 included all law enforcement with emphasis on counterdrug and counterterrorism missions**
- **June 1999 - Regional Office Consolidation Completed with LESO, Ft Belvoir, VA, becoming the central 1033 Program Office**

~ The 1033 Program ~ Current Program

Section 1033 of the National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 1997 authorizes the Secretary of Defense to transfer to Federal and State Agencies, Department of Defense excess personal property deemed suitable for use by such agencies in law enforcement activities, including counter-drug and counter-terrorism activities.





~ The 1033 Program ~ Current Program

Through Governor appointed State Coordinators and in accordance with signed Memorandums of Agreement between the States and DLA, the staff of the Law Enforcement Support Office effects the legal transfer of suitable equipment to LEAs. DLA administers the 1033 Program in consultation with the Attorney General and the Director of National Drug Control Policy, OSD.





~ The 1033 Program ~ Current Program

- **Eligibility to Agencies whose primary function is the enforcement of applicable Federal, State and Local Laws and whose compensated law enforcement officers have the powers of arrest and apprehension**
- **Program support focused on the law enforcement officer on the street, with emphasis on counterdrug/terrorism missions**





~ The 1033 Program ~ Conditions

- **Property must be excess to DoD**
- **Property must be deemed suitable for use by law enforcement**
- **Property is accepted on a “where-is, as-is basis”**
- **DoD will not incur any direct transfer costs**
- **Transportation/pick-up costs borne by the LEA**
- **Preference given to counterdrug/terrorism**



Acquisition Value Transferred **\$5,098,277,981**





DLA 1122 Program

- **The 1994 National Defense Authorization Act authorizes state and local governments to purchase law enforcement equipment suitable for use for counterdrug activities through the Federal Government. Each participating state has a State Point of Contact (SPOC) for this program.**
- **Sources of supply include DLA, GSA, Dept of Army**
- **DLA provides support thru Inventory Control Points (ICPs):**
 - **Defense Supply Center Columbus (item categories S9C/S9E) Provides items that include: spare parts for aircraft; holsters and gun parts; automotive parts; electronic items such as ADP equipment; video recording; television surveillance monitors; testing equipment; telephone equipment.**
 - **Defense Supply Center Richmond (S9G) - Provides items that include: safety and rescue equipment; riot control; alarm and security detection systems; aircraft repair parts; batteries; motor oil**




DLA 1122 Program

- Defense Supply Center Philadelphia (S9M/S9T) - Provides medical items such as first aid kits, search and rescue kits; clothing items such as uniforms; individual equipment such as helmets, body armor, tentage, water storage bags; and subsistence items like combat meals ready-to-eat.
- Defense Energy Support Center - Offers bulk fuel into-plane contracts for refueling at commercial airports.
- DLA items are identified by name (nomenclature) and national stock number. A stock number is needed to order an item.

Frequently Asked Questions (FAQs)

✓ **QUESTION:** Why can't LEAs receive the same types of property as received through the 1208 Program?

ANSWER: DLA applies a "suitable for use" determination for property transferred to LEAs under the 1033 Program

✓ **QUESTION:** Why can't LEAs receive office supplies, furniture and all the spare parts we can get?

ANSWER:

- The 1033 MOA between the states and DLA outlines that the Program should not supplement LEA normal operating budgets. Office supplies are considered funded within normal LEA operating budgets.
- Furniture is approved for new offices only; Other uses are referred to the Donation Program.
- Spare Parts and maintenance items are approved based on the fleet and maintenance operation of the LEA



Frequently Asked Questions (FAQs)

✓ **QUESTION:** Why are written justifications required on some items and not others?

ANSWER: Some items may not appear to have an obvious LEA application and require additional information prior to approval. Individual, maintenance and fleet items are approved based on the size of the LEA to avoid “stockpiling” of items.

✓ **QUESTION:** Why can't LEAs order online like other 21-Day customers for DRMS and RCP items? The time used to process a manual request often results in the item going to another customer.

ANSWER:

- 1033 Program automation is LESO's #1 priority. We are working with DRMS to address and develop workable solutions.
- This system must include a State Coordinator and LESO approval mechanism.



Frequently Asked Questions (FAQs)

✓ **QUESTION:** What if an LEA has an item and no longer requires it? Can they sell it or must they transfer the item to another LEA?

ANSWER: The answer depends on the type of item, how long the LEA has had the item and if the LEA has fulfilled the requirements as outlined in the MOA.

- Aircraft are in service for 5 years. If no longer needed prior to the 5 year rule, the State Coordinator should screen within the state for another LEA that has a need and contact LESO to coordinate the transfer. If the State does not have an LEA need for the aircraft, LESO is contacted to offer the item to the next LEA on the LESO National Priority List (NPL).
- Other items fall under the one year rule. After that time, LESO recommends that serviceable items no longer needed be transferred to other LEAs that have requirements by the state coordinator.
- LEAs must comply with DMIL and Trade Security Regulations.



Frequently Asked Questions (FAQs)

✓ **QUESTION:** Why do States have to maintain accurate records of items transferred to their LEAs through the 1033 Program?

ANSWER: IAW the MOA, the state has the requirement to maintain accurate records for items obtained by their LEAs through the 1033 Program.

- This requirement facilitates documentation and tracking when items are transferred from one LEA to another within the state
- Allows the state to track items with additional requirements such as DMIL, aircraft and weapons.
- Facilitates the state's internal compliance requirement. LESO recommends that the state evaluates a minimum of 10% of their LEAs per year to review compliance IAW the 1033 MOA as well as the State Plan of Operation.



Frequently Asked Questions (FAQs)

✓ **QUESTION:** What is the difference between operating a “transfer point” and a “warehouse”? What are the requirements of a transfer point?

ANSWER: A 1033 state transfer point is authorized; a warehouse is not.

- A transfer point is operated by some states as a means to facilitate the transfer of property from the DRMS to the intended LEA. This ties up state assets rather than LEA assets to pick-up property. Many states transfer property within 24-48 hours of receipt.
- A warehouse infers that a state is stockpiling items without having an individual LEA need. This violates the MOA between the state and DLA and undermines the spirit of the 1033 Program which is intended to support the “cop on the street” not subsidize state operations.
