Change of Command

A Tradition



The change of command ceremony is a military tradition that is rich with symbolism and heritage dating back to medieval times. Soldiers often carried staffs or standards into battle that identified them as a unit.

Throughout military history, unit colors have marked the position of the commander on the battlefield. In more recent times, the colors represent not only the heritage and history of the unit, but also the unity and loyalty of all its members, both military and civilian.

The colors are the commander's symbol of authority, representing his responsibilities to the organization.

The passing of the colors represents the transfer of authority and responsibility for the mission and welfare of the organization from one commander to another.

The significance of the change of command ceremony goes back to the beginning of our nation's history and provides for the orderly transfer of organizational responsibility and accountability.

The passing of the colors is a symbolic act, through which the outgoing commander relinquishes authority to his superior, who in turn passes the authority on to the incoming commander.

U.S. Army Brigadier General Kevin L. Cotman

DLA Distribution Commanding General



Brigadier General Kevin L. Cotman was born and raised in Hampton, Virginia. He was commissioned in the Quartermaster Corps through the United States Military Academy in 1994. He assumed command of DLA Distribution on July 22, 2025.

His first duty assignment was to the 24th Corps Support Group, Fort Stewart/Hunter Army Airfield, Georgia, where he served as Executive Officer, Headquarters and Headquarters Company, 260th Quartermaster Battalion,

Platoon Leader and then Executive Officer, 110th Quartermaster Company and Battalion S-1, 260th Quartermaster Battalion.

Cotman later served as the Petroleum Officer for 8th United States Army, Yongsan Garrison, Republic of Korea. Next, he was assigned to Fort Lee, Virginia, where he served as a Petroleum and Water Instructor and later commanded the 16th Quartermaster Company, 49th Quartermaster Group. After command, he completed Training with Industry with the ExxonMobil Corporation. He then served in the 2d Infantry Division, Camp Casey, Republic of Korea, as the Division Support Command Materiel Management Officer.

Following reassignment to Fort Bragg, North Carolina, Cotman was assigned to the 82nd Airborne Division. He initially served as the Battalion Operations Officer, 307th Forward Support Battalion. He was then assigned to the 782nd Main Support Battalion, 82nd Airborne Division as the Support Operations Officer. He later returned to the 307th Forward Support Battalion and deployed to Operation Enduring Freedom as the Materiel Management Officer. In the newly transformed, 307th Brigade Support Battalion, he served as Battalion Operations Officer, concluding his duty as the Battalion Executive Officer during Operation Iraqi Freedom.

He was then assigned as the Executive Officer to the Vice Director of the Army Staff and later served in the Joint Staff J-4 Logistics Directorate. Next, he commanded the 82nd Brigade Support Battalion, 3rd Brigade Combat Team, 82nd Airborne Division. After completing battalion command, he served as the Senior Sustainment Observer, Coach, Trainer at the Joint Readiness Training Center, Fort Polk, Louisiana. He then returned to the Republic of Korea where he served as the Chief, Plans and Exercise Division, United States Forces Korea J4. He then assumed command of Defense Logistics Agency Energy Americas, Houston, Texas. After command, he served as the Force Development-Logistics Division Chief, HQDA G-8. Prior to his arrival at JBLM, BG Cotman was the Executive Officer to the Deputy Chief of Staff, G-4.

Cotman holds a Master's Degrees in Business Administration from Webster University and National Resource Strategy from the Dwight D. Eisenhower School, National Defense University.

His awards and decorations include the Defense Superior Service Medal, Legion of Merit, Bronze Star Medal, Defense Meritorious Service Medal, Meritorious Service Medal, Senior Parachutist Badge, Combat Action Badge, Joint Chiefs of Staff Identification Badge and Army Staff Identification Badge.

Marcus Marvin Craig is a native of Muskogee, Oklahoma. He is a graduate of Muskogee High School and the Naval Academy Preparatory School. He received his commission from the United States Naval Academy in 2004 and holds a Master of Business Administration with a concentration in Petroleum Management from the University of Kansas School of Business.

Cmdr. Craig took command of DLA Distribution Puget Sound, Washington, on June 29, 2023. DLA Distribution Puget Sound, Washington, is primarily responsible

for providing Storage and Distribution support to the Puget Sound Naval Shipyard, Intermediate Maintenance Facility, the Trident Refit Facility, the surface and submarine fleet, and other federal agencies in the Pacific Northwest Region of the U.S.

Operationally, Cmdr. Craig served as Supply Officer onboard USS CAPE ST. GEORGE (CG 71), and the Aviation Support Division and Ship's Sales Division Officer onboard USS JOHN C. STENNIS (CVN 74). During his tours, he participated in Operation Enduring Freedom, RIMPAC, and conducted independent 7th Fleet Maritime Presence.

Ashore, he served as the Joint Logistics Operational Center Chief in the J-4 Directorate in U.S. Africa Command providing full spectrum logistics support to maintain operations and key strategic partnerships within the AFRICOM area of responsibility. He also served as Assistant to the Director of Supply Corps Detailing at the Office of Supply Corps Personnel (PERS-4412), and as the Aviation Support Equipment Integrated Weapons System Team Director (N9822) at Naval Supply Systems Command (NAVSUP) Weapon Systems Support Philadelphia. CDR Craig also was assigned to NAVSUP Fleet Logistics Center Site Diego Garcia where he served as the Fuels Officer for bulk fuel products and Assistant Supply Officer for Naval Support Activity Diego Garcia. Additionally, he served as Force Supply Continuous Process Improvement Officer, the Assistant Naval Air Station Officer for Policy and Inspections, and the Facilities Manager at Commander Naval Air Forces Pacific. While assigned to University of Kansas, he worked as a supply chain analyst intern at the Hawker Beechcraft Corporation's Logistics Center.

Cmdr. Craig is a qualified Surface Warfare Supply Corps Officer and Naval Aviation Supply Officer and has earned Level 3 Life Cycle Logistics and Acquisition Professional Membership.
